The welfare of Finnish society is based on knowledge and expertise
– citizens need equal learning opportunities.

Student performance in Finland is among the world's best - excellent learning outcomes are achieved with just average expenditure.



EXCELLENCE BASED ON EQUALITY, TRUST AND FLEXIBILITY

Equal learning opportunities for everyone (free education, free school meals).
Most education is publicly funded - learning and welfare are extensively
supported and tailored to individual needs.



Finland has a flexible education model, road is left open all the way up to higher education.

The international PISA assessments have ranked Finnish students among the world's best in reading, mathematics and science.

The average class size in basic education is 20 pupils – Finnish pupils spend less time in the classroom than their international peers.

Finland has a firmly grounded belief in providing schools with autonomy and support. This means a great deal of freedom for schools and teachers.

Teaching profession is very popular and highly respected in the Finnish society. Master's degree studies include pedagogical studies and teaching practice. Only 10 percent of all applicants are accepted on teacher training studies.



A Highly Educated Country

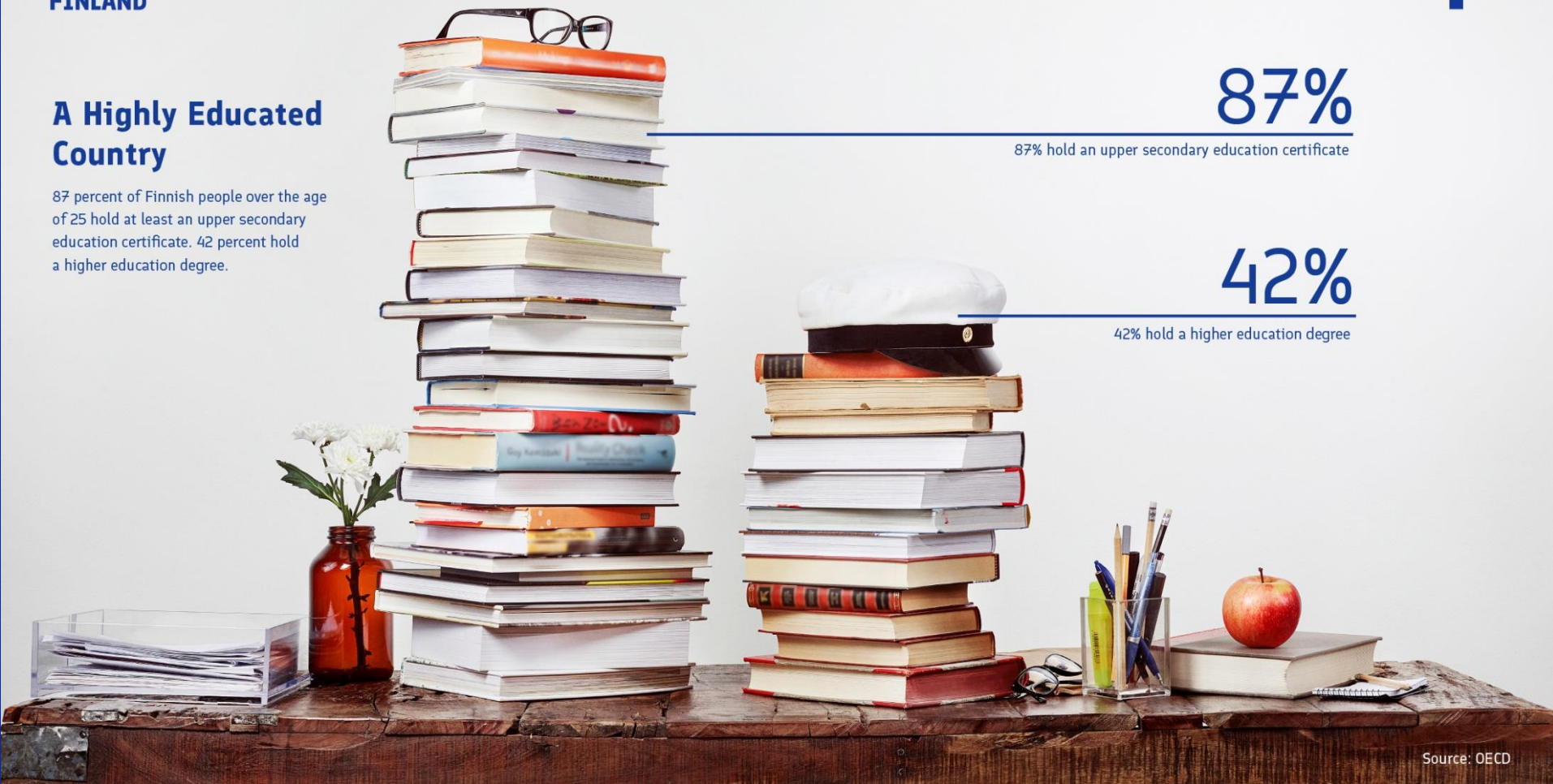
87 percent of Finnish people over the age of 25 hold at least an upper secondary education certificate. 42 percent hold a higher education degree.

87%

Almost 90% of Finnish people hold at least an upper secondary education certificate (between the ages of 25 and 64), more than 40 percent hold higher education degrees.

90%

More than 90% begin general or vocational upper secondary studies immediately after basic education.

50%

Today around 50% apply for vocational upper secondary studies immediately after basic education (compared to around 40% 10 years ago).
